High School Equivalency Program

What is the High School Equivalency Program (HEP)?

The High School Equivalency Program (HEP) is a secondary education program designed for migrant and seasonal farmworkers. The objective of HEP is to prepare them to obtain a High School Equivalency Certificate through the General Educational Development (GED). We support them in their academic, vocational and personal development, seeking to obtain the confidence and preparation necessary for Higher Education or the exploration of new labor challenges.

Eligibility

1. You, or an immediate family member, have spent a minimum of 75 days during the past 24 months as a migrant or seasonal farmworker; or
2. You:
 - are eligible to participate, or have participated within the past 24 months, in the MEP or NFJP (COE); and
 - have not earned a secondary school diploma or its equivalent; and
 - are not currently enrolled in elementary or secondary school; and
 - are 18 years or older; and
 - are in need of the academic and supporting services and financial assistance, determined by the program

ONLINE CLASSES

Online platform and tutoring in English three to four times a week

50 STUDENTS

Are eligible to the program. Includes books, platform vouchers, test vouchers, and intensive working days
